Holidays in Iyar

Yom HaShoah Thursday, April 8

(It was observed by the Milwaukee Jewish Community on Sunday, April 11, watch the recording here.)

Yom HaShoah, also known as Holocaust Remembrance Day, both commemorates the death of the 6 million Jews who were murdered by the Nazis but also recognizes the role of the partisans, righteous gentiles, and all those who resisted the horrors of that time.

Yom HaZikaron Wednesday, April 14

(Observed by the Milwaukee Jewish Community on Tuesday, April 13 at 6 pm. details and registration at Milwaukee Jewish.org/Yamim.)

Yom HaZikaron is Israel's Memorial Day. On this day, we commemorate Israeli fallen soldiers and all those killed by terrorist attacks.

Yom HaAtzmaut Thursday, April 15

(Observed by the Milwaukee Jewish Community on April 18 at 2 pm. details and registration at Milwaukee Jewish.org/Yamim.)

Yom HaAtzmaut is Israel's Independence Day. It celebrates the creation of Israel 73 years ago.

Lag B'Omer Friday, April 30

Lag B'Omer celebrates the 33rd day in the counting of the Omer (these are the days between Pesach and Shavuot). On this day, a plague that killed 24,000 of Rabbi Akiva's students finally came to an end and his students stopped dying. It is also the yahzeit (anniversary of death) of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochi, the author of the Zohar (core text of Kabbalah, Jewish mysticism). Before his death, he requested that the anniversary of his death be a day of celebration, not of sorrow. Today Lag B'Omer is celebrated with bonfires, picnics, archery, and many 3 year old boys getting their first haircuts.

Yom Yerushalayim Monday, May 10

Yom Yerushalayim (Jerusalem Day) celebrates the reunification of Jerusalem in 1967 during the Six Day War. This year marks 54 years since Jerusalem was once again a place open to people of all religions to visit their holy sites and worship.




increased risk for violence in their relationships during this time. If you or someone you know is in danger, remember that you/they are not alone.
