Rosh Hashanah

Rosh Hashanah is the beginning of the new Jewish year. It celebrates the creation of the world. It is on *Rosh Hashanah* that the Jewish calendar begins a new year (it will become 5782). *Rosh Hashanah* is a time for prayer, reflection on past deeds, and a commitment to improve in the coming year. The holiday is also the beginning of the Ten Days of Repentance, culminating with *Yom Kippur*. This year *Rosh Hashanah* falls on Tuesday, September 7-Wednesday, September 8.

Yom Kippur

Yom Kippur (The Day of Atonement) is a day of prayer, fasting, and repentance. This is the last day to ask God for forgiveness for our wrongs during the past year.

Yom Kippur is a stringent fast (it lasts for 25 hours). It begins at sunset of the previous evening (this year at 6:43 pm in Milwaukee), and ends when there are 3 stars in the sky the next night (this year 7:42 pm in Milwaukee). This year *Yom Kippur* falls on **Thursday, September 16**.

Sukkot

Sukkot is arguably the happiest holiday on the Jewish calendar. In fact, on *Sukkot*, we are commanded to rejoice. We celebrate *Sukkot* with all our senses and our whole body. We smell and wave the 4 species, we sit in the *Sukkah*, and eat festive meals there. This year *Sukkot* is from **Tuesday, September 21-Monday, September 27**.

Shmini Atzeret & Simchat Torah

At the end of *Sukkot*, we spend a couple more days celebrating. We start to pray for rain (in Israel it is the beginning of the rainy season) and we rejoice with the Torah as we finish the cycle of Torah reading and immediately begin reading the Torah again. This year *Shmini Atzeret* falls on **Tuesday, September 28**. *Simchat Torah* is celebrated by some Jews on **Tuesday, September 28** and by others on **Wednesday, September 29**.

LOMED Back to School Professional Development

On August 24, CJL held a Back to School Professional Development program for teachers in local Jewish schools. Forty-four educators from six schools came together to hear from a panel of experts about inclusion and making students feel welcome:

- Rabbi Alter spoke about LGBTQ
- Rabbi Hannah Wallick spoke about multifaith families
- Jennifer Saber spoke about disability
- Chelsea Cross spoke about Racial diversity



After listening to the speakers, teachers went into breakout rooms for small group discussions with teachers from their schools about how to apply what they learned in the coming school year. Daily Student Inventory

Our students travel to our classrooms each session with a suitcase full of baggage from the day. As the teacher we are often unaware of a student's feelings, home life, health, etc. Here are some simple tools to take a student's daily temperature in person or in the Zoom space:

1. At the beginning of each session, as a class community, ask each student to share one thing about their day, week or weekend
2. As the students walk in, distribute a piece of paper to each one. Ask them to write one word to describe how they are feeling today walking into the classroom (for the teacher's eyes only). And / or ask them to write down one thing they need to leave at the door so they can be present in their learning today. This activity can be done on Zoom in the chat box. Ask students to send a private message to you. Older students can pull out their phones and send you a text.
3. This tip is from a Facebook post called "Handle with Care". Here is a note to send home to parents. Put it into your own language.

"If your family is experiencing difficulties at home I would like to provide additional support at school. I understand that you are not always able to share details and that's okay. If your child is coming to school after a difficult night, morning or weekend, please text me "Handle with Care." Nothing else will be said or asked. This will let me know that your child may need extra time, patience or help during the day."



LOMED: Learning Opportunities for Milwaukee Educators

LOMED classes are open to all educators working at Milwaukee Jewish schools. The \$300 stipend for completing 10 hours of training is available to all teachers participating in the program.

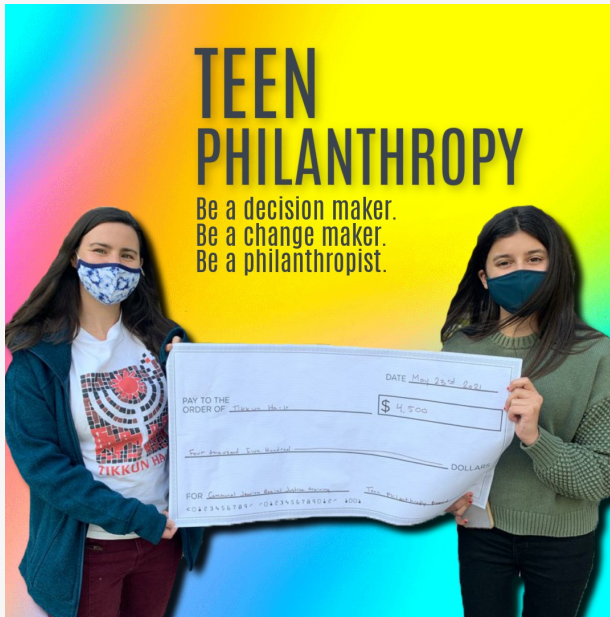
