Welcome to a new school year! It is such an exciting time, meeting new students and parents, seeing children's eyes light up as they see one another after a busy summer. I hope the positive energy stays with you through the year ahead.

CJL has some new things planned this year as well. We are still looking for college age students and young adults to join our Mentorship Moments Program (co-sponsored by Hillel MKE). Participants will be placed as teachers in local Sunday Schools, have 4 professional development workshops during the year, and be assigned a mentor to support them in their schools. They will also earn a \$180 stipend (plus their pay for teaching). Contact <u>Tzipi</u> for more information or to recommend someone for the program.

Our fourth cohort of BINAH begins in October. Join together with educators from preschools, day schools, and supplementary schools for a year of monthly learning and growth. The program includes a \$500 stipend. Apply <u>here</u>.

Elulis the month before Rosh Hashanah. The Hebrew word אלול is an

acronym for אני לדודי ודודי לי which means I am to my beloved as my beloved is to me (from the Song of Songs). During *Elul*, we search our hearts and strive to connect with God. During the month of *Elul* it is traditional to hear the *Shofar* blown every day (except *Shabbat*) to remind ourselves to wake up and do *teshuva* (repent).

Rosh Hashanah

Rosh Hashanah is the beginning of the new Jewish year. It celebrates the creation of the world. It is on *Rosh Hashanah* that the Jewish calendar begins a new year (it will become 5783). *Rosh Hashanah* is a time for prayer, reflection on past deeds, and a commitment to improve in the coming year. The holiday is also the beginning of the Ten Days of Repentance, culminating with *Yom Kippur*. This year *Rosh Hashanah* falls on Monday, September 26 and Tuesday, September 27.

Choose to Offer Choice

When my 17 year old daughter was a toddler she wouldn't eat a lick of vegetables. Our pediatrician suggested that I put out two veggies for my daughter to choose from. With me being content with either option. I'm happy to report it worked! And since it worked so well, I carried on this advice of empowering my children with choice still until this day.

Thinking about our students, they have choices made for them everyday, relinquishing their power to a higher power. Chores, bedtime, going to school, screen time, taking a test, etc. What would happen in our classrooms if we gave them the power of choice? As you are planning for the new school year, where do you see student choice as a possibility? Here are some suggestions:

- Get to know your students. Do they like to draw? Play games? Act? Write stories? Once you ascertain this, you will have a better sense of what choices to offer. Something agreeable to them and to you.
- When you teach a topic, think about offering 2-3 choices to the students to demonstrate their learning. For example, if you are teaching about the symbols of Rosh Hashanah, students can draw the symbols, listen to a song about the holiday and write a new verse, play a matching game (<u>Concentration</u>) with the symbols. Think about all the choices you are happy with, and those that meet your learning goals.
- Do you assign seats or let the students choose their seats? Students know their own learning style and may want to sit closer to the board to see better or sit in a seat not facing the open classroom door because the passing foot traffic is a distraction.
- Do your students like to work alone, in *chevruta* (with a partner) or in a small group? Are there activities in your lesson plans where you can offer this choice to your students? I find in my own teaching that Hebrew lessons often lend itself to this flexibility.
- A simple task, like the option to put a coat on a chair or at the back of the classroom, can make a student feel like they have a say in their learning environment even with the authority of a teacher at the head of the class.
