The Fast of the 17th of *Tammuz*

The Fast of the 17th of Tammuz (this year on Sunday, July 17) is a fast day on the Jewish calendar (the 17th of Tammuz falls on Shabbat this year, so the fast is delayed until Sunday). This fast day commemorates

many sad things that happened on this date, including:

1. Moses broke the 10 Commandments (after seeing the Golden Calf)
2. The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Babylonians in 586 BCE
3. The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 CE
4. More than 4,000 Jews were killed in Spain 1391 CE
5. The city of Prague was burned and looted in 1559 CE
6. The Kovno Ghetto was "liquidated" in 1944 CE

The Fast of the 17th of Tammuz (observed during daylight hours only) will be from 3:28 am until 9:02 pm in Milwaukee.

The 17th of Tammuz marks the beginning of the "Three Weeks" when Jews traditionally mourn the destruction of the First and Second Bet Hamikdash (Holy Temple) in Jerusalem. These three weeks culminate in the fast day of Tisha B'Av (this year Sunday, August 7).

We will be starting another BINAH cohort in the fall. The program is a year long commitment to monthly learning. It is open to teachers in any local Jewish schools. 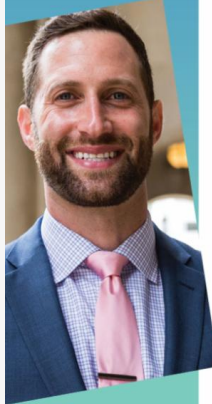
